Concept Note

It is generally assumed that cultures are linked to geographical spaces and the people who inhabit these spaces. However, with the growing influence of the "global" over what is still considered "local," cultural conflicts, misinterpretations of cultural practices and the fear of hybridity seem to be on the rise. One of the reasons for this emergent phenomenon could be the internet and communication technologies that assisted the global culture industry to reach the remotest corners of the earth. Many small and marginal communities continue their ethnic practices of food, dress, songs, stories and lifestyle; inhabiting the same geographical spaces of their forefathers, even as images and stories about places and people from distant lands reach them through television and the internet.

There is an obvious mismatch between the speed of communication and the mobility of people across continents and nations. Some cultural studies scholars tend to focus more on the symbolic, representational forms of culture than on their organic links with lived practices of peoples and communities. It is important therefore to explore and understand the organic links between the symbolic forms such as songs, rituals, dress and music and lived practices like marriage, child birth, language and food.

The Aloysian Literature Festival, aims to create awareness among students, teachers and the public about marginal cultures and identities through this central theme.


